

## Why you should visit Toronto this summer

**K**nown for its modern vibe and abundance of culture, Toronto, once again, is looking forward to opening its doors to tourists in Summer 2022. The attractions below undeniably will make you want to come here and check out this amazing city.



### The Rogers Center

This stadium features the world's first fully retractable, motorized dome-shaped roof. It covers eight acres which is enough to shelter two city blocks.

### St. Lawrence Market

National Geographic recognized this spot as the best food market in the world in 2012. The achievement was due to market's cheese and dairy products offering over 700 options for sale.



### Caribbean Carnival

A celebration of Caribbean culture that brings over one million people to Toronto annually. This is equivalent of every single resident of Trinidad leaving the city and traveling to Toronto.

### The CN Tower Edge Walk

This breathtaking experience features a stroll along a five foot (1.5m) ledge around the top of the tower's main pod 356m/1168ft (116 storeys) above the city. In 2011, it was added to The Guinness Book of Records as the "highest external walk on a building."



### The Historic Distillery District

This spot is not only popular for trendy bars and restaurants, but it is also believed by many to be one of the most haunted places in Toronto. For years, locals have been reporting various paranormal activities such as opening and closing of doors, unexplained banging noises and flickering lights.

### The Bata Shoe Museum

The world's largest museum dedicated to footwear represents 4500 years of history and houses over 14,000 shoes.



### Toronto Zoo

The largest zoological park in Canada, it's a home to over 5,000 animals. Featuring 287 hectares (710 acres) it's roughly the size of Central Park in New York.

### Ripley's Aquarium

Home to North America's longest underwater viewing tunnel, the walkway is 96 m (315 ft) long which is approximately two thirds of the length of an Olympic swimming pool.



### Restaurants

Toronto features over 7,500 restaurants from 200 different cuisine cultures. It would take a person almost 20 years to try them all if they ate at one restaurant a day.

### Royal Ontario Museum

In addition to dinosaur fossils and meteorites, the Royal Ontario Museum's world class collection of 13 million items is a permanent home to nine Egyptian mummies, four of which are displayed in the Galleries of Africa: Egypt exhibit.
